Nordic Security Conference, August 29th 2013 Opening marks by Hanna Birna Kristjansdottir, Minister of Interior

Good morning.

One of the important ingredients of having a progressive cyber security culture and awareness is to have a vibrant community of cyber security experts, which can have an international forum for informing and exchanging views on the latest developments and techniques.
